

Making an Abuse Complaint

The Catholic Church in Australia, acknowledges with deep sadness and regret that a number of clergy and religious and other Church personnel have abused children, young people and adults who have been in their pastoral care. The Church is committed to offering whatever healing is possible to victims of abuse and in preventing abuse in the future.

If you, or someone that you know, has been the victim of abuse by Church personnel you should report the matter directly to the police for investigation. Alternatively, you can contact your local Church Authority or the Queensland Professional Standards Office who will assist you to report the matter to the police.

If you choose not to report the matter to the police you may wish to consider entering the Towards Healing process.

The Queensland Professional Standards Office is responsible for managing the Towards Healing process. The Office is independent of Church Authorities, and a neutral party, which ensures that proper processes are followed, and the matter is resolved as quickly as is possible in the circumstances. The Professional Standards Office is committed to making balanced and well-informed decisions and will manage the process fairly and impartially.

Towards Healing

A protocol for addressing complaints of abuse against Catholic Church Personnel

Towards Healing was established in 1996 and is a process offered by the Catholic Church to those who have been abused by a priest, religious or other Church personnel including employees and volunteers appointed to positions of pastoral care on behalf of the Church. Towards Healing also formalises the Church's principles and procedures for responding to complaints of abuse.

The goal of Towards Healing is to address the needs and concerns of those abused by Church personnel. It offers abuse victims the opportunity to tell their story, personally and directly, to someone in authority in the Church, who will accept responsibility for what happened to him or her, acknowledge the damage he or she has suffered, give a sincere apology, and offer pastoral care and reparation.



Key Principles

Towards Healing sets out a number of principles relating to the management of abuse complaints including:

- Any attempt to sexualise a pastoral relationship is a breach of trust, an abuse of authority and professional misconduct.
- Any form of sexual behaviour with a child or young person (under 18yrs), is always sexual abuse. It is both immoral and criminal.
- Physical and emotional cruelty constitute an abuse of power.

What is Abuse?

Under Towards Healing 'abuse' is defined as:

- Sexual assault of another person.
- Sexual harassment of another person.
- Any conduct of a sexual nature with another person which is inconsistent with the integrity of the pastoral relationship.
- An intentional act on a child or young person (under 18yrs) causing significant physical injury.
- Other behaviour towards a child or young person (under 18yrs) causing serious physical pain or mental anguish (without legitimate disciplinary purpose).

Features

Under Towards Healing, no two cases are the same. Each case, and each outcome, depends on the individuals involved on both sides. However, the main features of the Towards Healing process are:

- pastoral
- victim-focused
- restorative
- optional
- confidential – the victim need not have his or her story in the public domain
- non-adversarial
- relatively quick and inexpensive
- tailored to the needs of each victim as an individual
- facilitates re-establishment of relationship with the Church if that is desired
- offers an apology and acknowledgement by the Church Authority
- can provide financial payment as reparation, not compensation
- assists in prevention of future abuse
- seeks to assist in the psychological and spiritual healing of people affected by incidents of abuse.

Process

Although the Towards Healing process may vary from case to case, the process can include the following steps:

Contact Report

A contact report (written and signed complaint) will be obtained from the victim. The complaint resolution process is explained and counselling is also usually offered to the victim.

Response

The allegations will be referred to the relevant Church Authority. The Church Authority will put the allegations to the accused person if possible. The accused person may be stood aside pending investigation.

Investigation

If the allegations are denied, and the Director of Professional Standards believes it necessary, an independent person may be appointed to investigate the allegations and make findings.

Facilitation

Depending on the findings of the assessment, a facilitator is appointed to manage communications between the victim and the Church Authority. This may involve a meeting managed by the facilitator. The outcomes of that meeting typically include an apology, payment of counselling costs, and agreed financial assistance or reparation.

Outcomes relating to the perpetrator

Where the claim is accepted or admitted, or substantiated by the investigation process, the Church Authority will decide what action it should take with respect to the perpetrator.

Review

An independent review process is available for people who feel that the process was not followed properly or the findings of the investigation are flawed.

Not a Compensation Scheme

Towards Healing is not intended to be a scheme for providing "compensation" to victims for damages. Rather, its aim is to provide pastoral care. However, in many cases, some financial assistance, as a form of reparation, is made.

Not a Criminal Investigation

Towards Healing is not intended to be a substitute for a criminal investigation. The Church strongly encourages victims to report the abuse to police. The Church itself is likewise obliged to inform authorities.

Not a Disciplinary Scheme

Although Towards Healing is not intended to be a disciplinary scheme for Church personnel accused of abuse it does provide a means for the investigation of complaints, which may well lead to some form of disciplinary action. Towards Healing does not impose penalties on perpetrators. Each Church Authority will decide what action it should take with respect to the perpetrator.
